

## Story

Atelier Cho Thompson created the identity concept and interior design/architecture for a new restaurant, Gioia, located in a historic brick building that was once home to a legendary Italian eatery. Wooster Street in New Haven was home to the city's first Italian-American immigrants, and their colorful and vibrant history and traditions define the neighborhood to this day. The designers tasked themselves with paying homage to this history while also embracing a

new generation of younger folks and families settling in Wooster Square.
Gioia joins a legacy of warm hospitality through its contemporary, lively atmosphere and visual identity, resulting in a project that is a bold, playful, and inventive addition to its community.

# **Iconography**

The logo plays off of the iconic archway at the entrance to Wooster Square, which also echoes the restaurant's windows and doors. It is minimal, friendly, and a touch feminine, in honor of the strong Italian women immigrants who built the neighborhood.







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An arched grid (underlaid in pink) unifies the wordmark and iconography into one cohesive visual system.









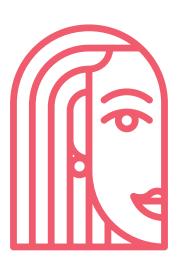




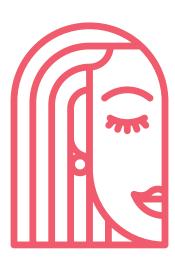
### **Icon Set**

The full set of marks includes an icon for Gioia Market, an Italian market attached to the restaurant; Gioia Rooftop, the cocktail program on the roof deck; and the Gelato takeout window along the side of the building.

The visual system designed allows for variation in each subset of the brand while still maintaining a strong sense of consistency.



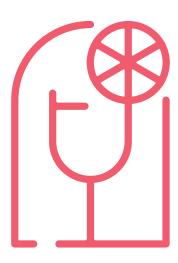




**Primary Mark**

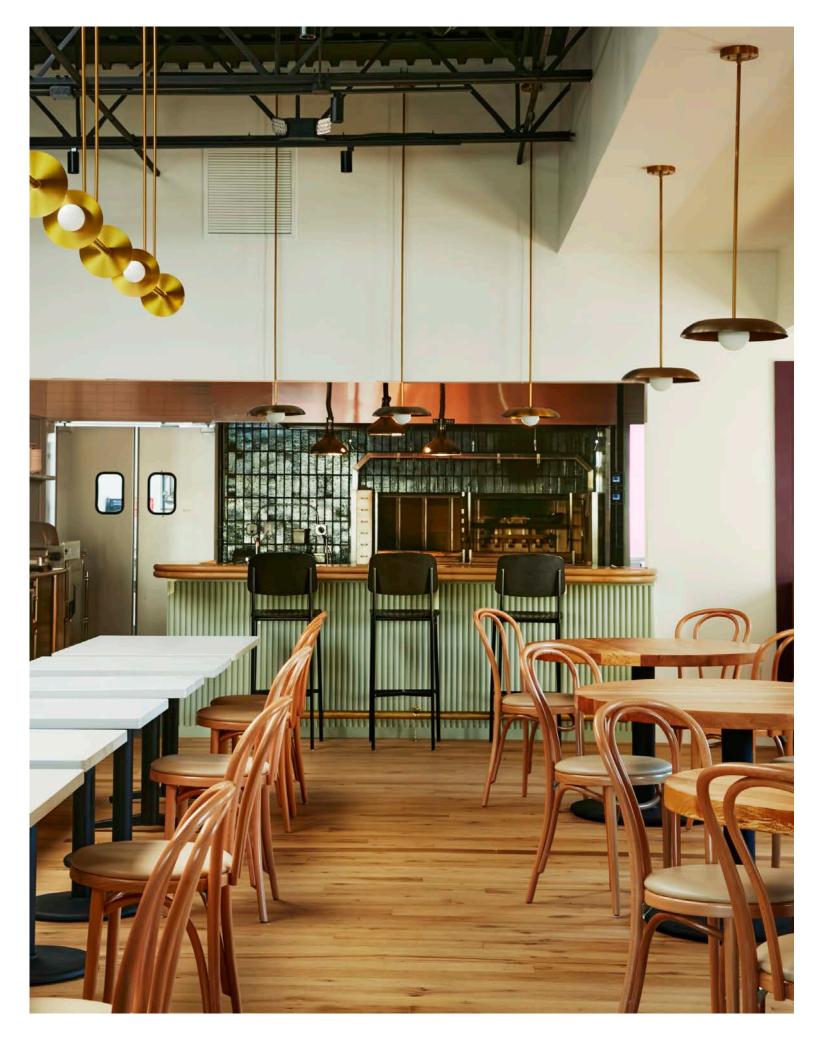














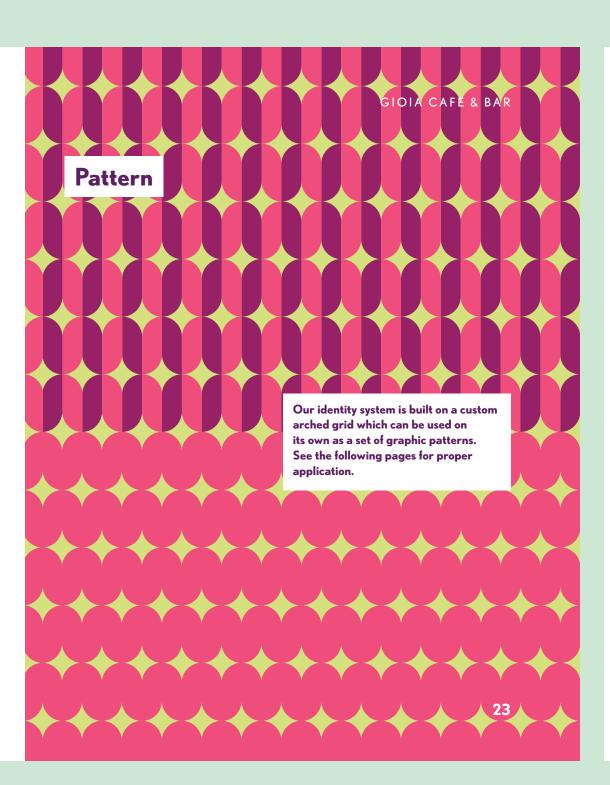

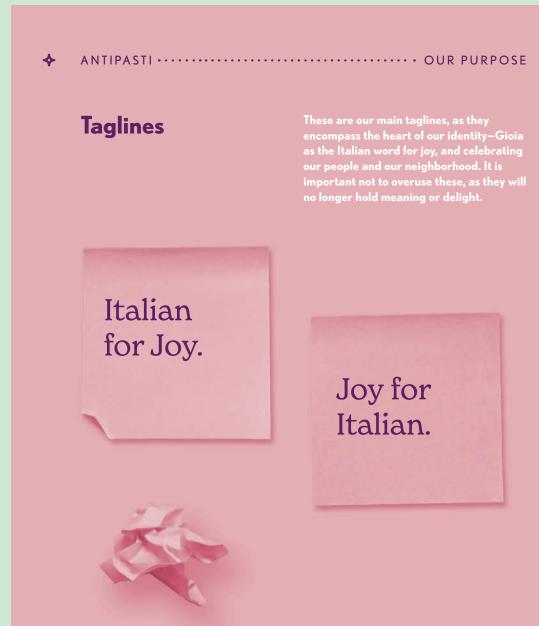
